#### **Reflecting on 2024: Key Achievements**

In 2024, we expanded our network of development partners by welcoming the Development Bank of Latin America and the Caribbean (CAF) and the World Bank (WB) into our ecosystem. This strategic growth enhances our ongoing collaborations with the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB), the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP).

#### **CWWA Year in Review I 2024**

#### Accelerating in 2025 and beyond

As we advance into 2025, the final year of our Strategic Plan 2022-2025, we are unwavering in our commitment to the six core pillars that define our direction and drive our work plan. These pillars will continue to shape every action and decision we make. They are **Resource Mobilisation**, Communication, Knowledge Creation and Exchange, Training and Capacity Building, Leveraging Technology Membership and **Engagement.** 

Under the stewardship of Executive Director Laurayne Lucky and guide by the Board of Directors, we have outlined a comprehensive work plan for the fiscal years 2025-2026, Here is a snapshot of what to look forward to in the coming months.

- Component 1 emphasizes Capacity Development and **Training**, aiming to equip representatives with vital skills in areas like climate-resilient infrastructure, wastewater management, drought planning, disaster response, and groundwater management. Collaborating organizations such as CIMH, CDEMA, UNECO IHP, CDB, IDB, and the World Bank will provide expertise and support, this initiative is designed to foster regional resilience through knowledge sharing and skill enhancement in the water sector.
- In line with modern communication trends, Component 2 introduces a Webinars and Podcast Series to disseminate knowledge on key thematic areas such as non-revenue resilience, management, climate disaster water preparedness, and innovative water technologies. Scheduled bi-monthly, these sessions will involve sector experts and thought leaders from organizations like GWP-C and CAWASA. This component will help bridge gaps in knowledge dissemination, making information accessible to a broader audience, including remote communities and professionals unable to attend in-person events.

- Further expanding on stakeholder engagement, Component 3 focuses on Public Education, Stakeholder Collaboration, and Outreach. This includes social learning campaigns targeting youth, promoting water conservation, climate risk adaptation, and public health through WASH initiatives. Partnerships with organizations like UNICEF, CCCCC, and regional water utilities will amplify the impact of these efforts, promoting sustainable practices and advocacy throughout the Caribbean.
- Components 6 to 8 include initiatives focused on youth and high-level stakeholder engagement. The Youth Symposium on Water Security and Climate Resilience targets young leaders aged 17-21, providing a forum for dialogue and advocacy on key water sector issues. The Young Professionals Network will promote mentorship and professional development. Finally, the Annual High-Level Forums for Caribbean Ministers will continue to provide a platform for advancing the regional water and sanitation agenda, supporting collaboration among policymakers and utility heads.



### Nature-Based Solutions for Wastewater Management: A Regional Approach

On April 25th, 2024, the CWWA Wastewater Specialist Group hosted a webinar focused on nature-based solutions for wastewater management in the region, attracting around 100 registered participants. Presentations featured insights from the Tobago Services Division of WASA-T&T, UN Habitat, and the Martinique Water Office, covering topics such as constructed wetlands, lagoon systems, and waste stabilization ponds within their respective territories.

#### Wastewater Reuse in the Region: Taking the Waste out of Wastewater

On July 16th, 2024, the Wastewater Specialist Group hosted its second webinar, which focused on the role of water reuse in enhancing water security and managing wastewater in the region. The session featured presentations from Mr. Brian Stuart of the Barbados Water Authority, Ms. Allison Elcock of WASA-T&T, and Mr. Mark Barnett, CWWA Past President.

## Incident Command System (ICS) - Level 100 Training

On September 10th, 2024, the CWWA Health and Safety & Disaster Management Specialist Group hosted a training session on the fundamentals of emergency coordination, response, and management, presented by Alberto Burrero in collaboration with Operators Without Borders (OWB) and the Caribbean Water & Sewerage Association (CAWASA). The session focused on the purpose of ICS, emphasizing its role in providing a flexible, scalable framework for coordinating resources, personnel, and processes during emergencies.

Utility representatives learned how to register on the platform, upload their data, and utilize the new dashboards and features. The session also covered Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), management practices, and provided access to the Caribbean Water Community for enhanced collaboration.

## REGIONAL MEETINGS INVOLVING CWWA PARTICIPATION

### **CARICOF 2024**

The Caribbean Climate Outlook Stakeholder Forum (CARICOF) for the wet season was held on May 23rd and 24th, 2024 in Guyana and included the delivery of forecasts for the upcoming wet and hurricane season. The event primarily targeted Disaster Risk Managers, addressing the potential climate extremes expected in the year ahead and their significant implications for climate risk management. Additionally, the Dry Season forum took place in St. Lucia on November 28th and 29th, 2024.





#### **CDM 13**

The 13th Caribbean Conference on Comprehensive Disaster Management (CDM 13) took place from December 2nd-6th, 2024, Marriott Hotel, St. Kitts. Under the theme "Road to Resilience: Checkpoint 2024 – Levelling Up for a Dynamic Future," the conference delivered impactful sessions focused on advancing disaster resilience across the Caribbean.

### XVI Meeting of National Committees & Focal Points of the UNESCO Intergovernmental Hydrological Programme for LAC

The XVI Meeting of National Committees and Focal Points of the UNESCO Intergovernmental Hydrological Programme for Latin America and the Caribbean was held on November 4th-5th, 2024, in Puntarenas, Costa Rica. This biannual event focuses on planning and monitoring the implementation of the programme across the region. The President of the CWWA Board represented the Association.

# REGIONAL MEETINGS INVOLVING CWWA PARTICIPATION

## **UN-SIDS 4**

The fourth United Nations, Conference on Small Island Developing States (SIDS4) took place from May 27th to 30th, 2024, in St John's, Antigua. Under the theme "*Charting the Course Toward Resilient Prosperity*" the Conference focused on assessing the ability of SIDS to achieve sustainable development, including the need for adequate and accessible financing, disaster risk reduction, climate change, water security and meeting the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals. The event concluded with the adoption of the Antigua and Barbuda Agenda for SIDS (ABAS) which sets out the sustainable development aspirations of SIDS over the next 10 years and the support required from the international community to achieve them. Representatives from the CWWA and Global Water Partnership-Caribbean (GWP-C) represented the regional water and sanitation community at the event.



## Financing Circular Economy Solutions for Waste Management

The workshop entitled "Zero Waste in the Caribbean: New Ways, New Waves," was organised by the United Nation Environment Programme, under the EU-funded initiative, co-financed by the German Cooperation in partnership with CARIFORUM. It was held over the period September 3rd to 6th, 2024, in Barbados.



This pivotal event focused on addressing key waste management challenges and promoting a circular economy across the region. It brought together stakeholders from both the public and private sectors, facilitating meaningful dialogue on sustainable solutions for waste management in the Caribbean.



#### **33RD CWWA ANNUAL CONFERENCE & EXHIBITION** 21st - 25th October 2024 Port of Spain, Trinidad

The theme for this year's event was "Collective Regional Action Toward a Climate Resilient, Water Secure and Zero Waste Caribbean'. The Conference portion of the event included a Pre-Conference Workshop, the official Opening Ceremony, a Plenary on Wastewater, technical presentations by over 60 participants, technical tours and the official Closing Ceremony. The Exhibition portion of the event involved a three-day

exhibition on water, wastewater and solid waste products and services from the Caribbean, North and South America and the United Kingdom. The event also included four days of High Level Ministerial meetings namely: the 20th High Level Forum (HLF) for Caribbean Ministers Responsible for Water; the 8th HLF for Caribbean Ministers Responsible for Solid Waste.

The CWWA Conference & Exhibition continues to provide a critical forum for the sustainable development of the water and sanitation sectors. The next Conference will be held in San Pedro, Belize 20th-24th October 2025.
